cc: Article V. MEMBERSHIP of the NACSA By law

Persons who subscribe to the stated purposes of NACSA, who agree to abide by the bylaws of the association, and who has graduate training in sociology or any of the social sciences or the social aspects of law, health, and medicine, qualify for NACSA membership. Membership shall be divided into three categories: Regular, Associate, and Student. Regular members shall be eligible to vote, hold office, and serve on the Board of Directors. Regular members shall pay annual dues of \$15. Associate members are persons who work as sociologists or social scientists outside of North America and may choose to pay a lower fee of \$10. Associate members shall have voting rights but are not eligible to hold office and serve on the Board of Directors. Student members are full-time graduate students in sociology or the social sciences and pay the student membership dues of \$5. Student members are not eligible to vote, hold office, and serve on the Board of Directors.

Membership dues shall be paid annually to the association on January 1 of each year. Instead of annual payment of membership dues, a single payment for life (Life Membership) of \$300 may be accepted. Once paid, the Life members shall not have to pay annual membership dues and shall have the same voting rights as Regular members. Benefits for dues-paying members include receiving two issues of NACSA's newsletter a year, being entitled a discount registration fee and free lunch for future NACSA conferences, rights to vote for NACSA officers and Board members, and receiving a periodically updated NACSA membership directory.

The 2011 NACSA Annual Conference

Las Vegas Nevada, August 19, 2011

The 2011 NACSA Annual Conference will be held on August 19th in Las Vegas, Nevada, following the great tradition of our association to hold a one-day mini-conference prior to the annual meetings of the American Sociological Association (August 20-23, 2011). The aim of this year's conference is broadly defined to be two-fold: to promote scholarly research on Chinese society, culture, economy, and immigrant life in the greater Chinese Diaspora, and to continue building bridges and *guanxi* among scholars of Chinese heritage and non-Chinese ancestry in North America, Asia, and other parts of the world.

Theme(s)

The themes of this year's conference are otherwise open. We call for submissions of regular papers/panels and will let other theme(s) emerge from the submissions. We encourage scholars and graduate students from mainland China, Hong Kong, Taiwan, and the greater Chinese Diaspora to submit papers/panels in either English or Chinese.

Sessions

The 2011 mini-conference will be holding 5-6 concurrent sessions and a special session, depending on the ASA space allocation.

- **Individual papers:** Complete papers or paper abstracts will be considered. Paper abstracts may be 1-2 pages but must contain sufficient detail and evidence of timely completion for the program committee in its decision making. **Please give all authors' and coauthors' names, organizational affiliations, and email addresses.**
- **Panels:** Any NACSA member can organize a panel. Each panel should consist of **two to three** presenters and a discussant. The panel organizer must submit a proposal specifying the theme of the panel along with the summaries/abstracts of the papers selected. **Pease give all panelists' names, organizational affiliations, and email addresses.**
- Submissions may be in English or in Chinese. The program committee assumes that the language used in individual papers/abstracts or panel proposals would be the same as the language used in presentation at the annual conference. Papers should be formatted as **Word** documents and sent as an attached file.

Acceptance Announcement: May 1, 2011

- Email announcements to all organizers/discussants/authors about the tentative panels to which their presentations are assigned

- A formal acceptance letter is to be provided to all the authors for their travel funding application and/or visa application purposes.

Min Zhou

Min Zhou is enjoying her role as the Chang Jiang Scholar Lecture Professor at Sun Yat-sen University. She has completed the first phase of her African migrants in Guangzhou project, focusing on racial attitudes of Guangzhou residents toward Africans and African migration into China. Data includes a questionnaire survey, in-depth interviews, and systematic field observations. Results will be reported at the 2011 NACSA conference in Las Vegas. She will continue to do the second phase of her research this summer, focusing on African migrants' attitudes toward Guangzhou residents and the city. Min's other project on Chinese immigrant transnational organizations is drawing to a close. Min will present a paper (with Portes), entitled "The Eagle and the Dragon: Immigrant Transnationalism and Development in Mexico and China" at the conference on Transnational Immigrant Networks at Princeton University, April 1-2, 2011; and another paper, entitled "Chinese Immigrant Transnationalism and Development in China" at the 2011 conference of the International Society for the Study of Chinese Overseas (ISSCO) at the Chinese University of Hong Kong, June 20-21, 2011.

The Department of Sociology invites applications from senior scholars who have a proven track record in research and publications and strong interest in both research and teaching to serve as the Head of the Department at the professorial grade. In addition to teaching at undergraduate and/or graduate levels and undertaking research, the successful candidate will be responsible for the strategic and operational management of the department, and promoting the research profile of the department. The appointee is also expected to play an active role as an academic leader of the discipline at a local and international level. The candidate should have a PhD Degree in Sociology, at least 10 years of higher education teaching experience and appropriate administrative experience. Research experience in Chinese societies will be an advantage. The Shanghai Key Laboratory for Urban Ecology and Sustainability (SKLUES) and School of Resources and Environment at East China Normal University (ECNU), Shanghai, China invite nominations and applications for nine tenure-track, open-rank faculty positions, beginning May 1st, 2011.

Under a new campus-wide initiative, SKLUES has identified urban ecology and urban sustainability as two intertwined areas of strategic emphasis, and adopted a transdisciplinary approach to urban ecosystem and sustainability research. SKLUES views an urban area as a coupled human and natural system (CHANS), and believes that a sustainable future resides in a harmony between human communities and their natural and built environments. Its research, education, and outreach activities focus on “ecology of cities”, instead of “ecology in cities”, with an emphasis on human safety, health, and well-being. To substantiate this strategic re-orientation and re-structuring, SKLUES invites nominations and applications for nine tenure-track, open-rank faculty positions in the following areas.

Position 1. Urban sustainability planning

SKLUES seeks scholars whose expertise in urban ecological planning and land use planning focuses on urban sustainability. Of particular interest are the applicants who have expertise in green infrastructure, low impact development, sustainable landscape planning and design, solid waste management, sustainable transportation planning, growth management, land use and transportation planning and policy, and have experience in GIS applications to planning, including planning support systems. An AICP or ASLA certificate is desirable but not required.

Position 2. Regional environmental economics

SKLUES seeks scholars whose expertise in environmental economics or ecological economics focuses on urban and regional environmental issues. Of particular interest are the candidates who have expertise and interests in applying economic principles to the study of regional and national ecological and environmental challenges China faces today as a result of rapid urbanization. The areas of challenges include, but are not limited to, regional water quality, water resources, biodiversity, land resources, farmland preservation, ecological footprint, and ecosystem services. Especially welcome are econometricists who are versed in theoretical and methodological approaches and prepared to collaborate with ecological, social, and humanities scholars and professionals.

Position 3. Urban ecological safety

SKLUES seeks scholars with expertise in an array of disciplines with a focus on the intersection of urban ecosystems and human safety. Especially welcome are applicants with credentials in urban climatology, urban ecology, urban geology, urban hydrology and hydro-informatics, coastal zone management, and urban ecological security systems. Of particular interest are candidates who have expertise in land subsidence, urban geological hazards, critical infrastructure protection (CIP), flood prevention, and emergency management.

Position 4. Public health and ecological health

SKLUES seeks scholars whose expertise in epidemiology, bio-statistics, environmental health, and public health focuses on the intersection of human health and urban ecosystems. Of particular interests are the applicants who have expertise in solid waste management, urban infectious disease, urban land use and public health. Especially welcome are bio-statisticians who are interested in the spatial and temporal relationships between urban ecological environment and public health issues.

Position 5. Urban Sociology and Anthropology

SKLUES seeks scholars whose expertise in urban sociology and/or urban anthropology focuses on social equity, which is broadly defined, in a rapidly urbanizing environment. Of particular interests are the applicants who have expertise in urban poverty, social demography, social and spatial stratification, qualitative and survey methods in sociology and anthropology research.

Position 6. Open field

SKLUES set one strategic position for a scholar of promising potentials. The specialty is wide open as long as relevant to the mission of SKLUES. Scholars of humanities, mathematics, and science are encouraged to apply.

Basic qualifications for all the positions are:

- 1) a Ph.D. in a related field by the start date of the appointment;
- 2) evidence of a high-quality research agenda;
- 3) a track record of/or potential for excellence in research, scholarship, and teaching;
- 4) capability of working in a multi-disciplinary team; and
- 5) competence to teach classes in English.
